NC Endangered Species Act

15A NCAC 10I

Protects all Listed Species from Take or Possession

No open season

Exceptions can be made through a permit

research

education

prior possession

Exceptions without a permit

in defense of life

conservation officers or WRC employee

possession of otherwise legal alligator parts

NC Listing Process

- Scientific councils are formed every 5 years
- They make recommended changes to the Nongame Wildlife Advisory Committee (NWAC)
- The NWAC makes recommended changes to the Wildlife Resources Commission
- Recommended changes go to public hearing
- NCWRC staff evaluate comments from public and take back to the Wildlife Resources Commission
- Final changes incorporated into NCAC

- Federally listed species are similarly state listed
- Additional species are also listed



NCWRC Responsibilities After Listing

- Ideally every listed species would receive monitoring and management effort
- Section 6 funding from FWS and NMFS for federally listed species
- NC Wildlife Action Plan identifies listed species and others as priorities
- State Wildlife Grant funds support some efforts for monitoring and management

NC Endangered Species in AP Area

Peregrine falcon

- Has been taken off the federal list (1999), but remains on the state list
- Still listed in NC due to low nesting numbers in NC and low nesting success
- Nest in mountains of NC and migrate mostly along the coast
- In Va. they also nest somewhat on the coast and in cities
- M&M: hacked birds in mountains, still monitor nesting

Endangered Species Continued

- Eastern diamondback rattlesnake
 - Probably no longer exist in AP region
 - A small population remains on Camp Lejeune (impact areas)
 - Need fire maintained habitat (longleaf)
 - M&M: Some surveys in appropriate locations



Threatened Species in AP Area

Bald eagle

- Removed from federal list in 2007
- Retained on state list due to relatively low nesting numbers and high need for seclusion
- Probably have about 200 nesting pairs in NC
- Population is rising, but with concerns over loss of habitat and AVM
- M&M: Hacked birds at Lake Mattamuskeet in early 1980's, continued monitoring through 2009


Threatened Species Continued

- Gull-billed tern
 - Beach nesters in relatively small numbers on Outer Banks and estuarine islands
 - Declining numbers
 - M&M: Lots of data since mid 1970's

Threatened Species Continued


- Rafinesque's big-eared bat
 - Roosts in large hollow trees or abandoned buildings (Roanoke River wetlands)
 - Information is very sparse and scattered
 - M&M: beginning some additional surveys this summer





NC Special Concern Amphibians in AP Area

- Neuse River waterdog
 - Only found in Neuse and Tar Rivers
 - Stays in water
 - M&M: re-conducting survey from 30 years ago



NC Special Concern Reptiles in AP Area

- Carolina pigmy rattlesnake
- Carolina watersnake
- Diamondback terrapin
- Outer Banks kingsnake
- Southern hognose snake
- Timber rattlesnake

Henslow's sparrow	Yellow-bellied sapsucker








Common Tern State Listed - Special Concern


- · Colonies at 15 sites
- Large colonies on Big Foot Island, Clark Reef, Cape Hatteras & Cape Lookout NS
- · Most nests (73%) were on natural sites






Least Tern State Listed - Special Concern

- Steady increase since 1997
- Most (91%) nests on natural sites
- Largest colonies found at inlets

NC Special Concern Mammals in AP Area

- Buxton Woods white-footed mouse
 - A subspecies of the white footed mouse (Peromyscus leucopus)
 - Only found on the southern end of Hatteras Island in Maritime forest
