\$50,000 IN GRANTS AWARDED BY THE ALBEMARLE-PAMLICO NATIONAL ESTUARY PROGRAM (APNEP)

APNEP would like to thank all of our 2009 Schoolyard Demonstration Project grant applicants. We were delighted by the variety and number of proposals received this year. Such a response clearly demonstrates an understanding of and desire to protect our natural resources.

After careful deliberation, the APNEP Citizens' Advisory Committee has selected five projects for funding this year. The committee evaluated schoolyard demonstration project proposals submitted by school systems, community colleges, local governments and non-profit organizations in the program region, which is in 35 counties in northeastern North Carolina and southeastern Virginia.

The volunteers at Blackbeard's Landing in New Bern along the Neuse river have been monitoring water quality with APNEP for more than 10 years. This dedicated group has made significant contributions toward the health of our estuary by volunteering their time to contribute to our ongoing data set, which is used to identify long-term trends and changes in water quality. The monitoring group at Blackbeard's Landing is also considered a good ambassador to the Citizens' Monitoring Network as they teach others in their community about water quality and its effects on the environment.

Because the Albemarle-Pamlico estuary is so large and human impacts are so diverse, assistance is needed to monitor our estuary. The wide expanse of waters that makes up the estuary if often more accessible to local citizens who live near the estuary. Citizens allow us to monitor areas of the estuary that might not be monitored otherwise due to limited government resources.

Corps Rejects Asian Oysters in Chesapeake Bay

State and federal officials and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers have decided not to introduce Asian oysters into the Chesapeake Bay.

Instead, Maryland, Virginia and the federal government will try to restore the bay's native oyster population. However, officials caution that the effort will be expensive and there is no guarantee of broad success.

The corps studied the possibility of introducing Asian oysters for five years, which cost about \$17 million that was shared among the states and the federal government. Officials estimate that restoring the native oyster fishery will cost \$50 million per year for 10 years. About \$5 million per year has been spent on this effort since 1994.
