As summer begins to draw to a close, APNEP staff are focusing on a number of initiatives that will take place this fall. With data collected over the summer, APNEP and partners will be beginning creation of a third <u>map of the region's submerged aquatic vegetation (SAV)</u>. This map will help us to assess long-term trends in both SAV and water quality in the Albemarle-Pamlico estuary. We'll also be publishing a ArcGIS Story Map that showcases the collaborative efforts underway in order to protect this vital resource.

In early September, APNEP's <u>Ecological Flows Action Team</u> will meet to discuss the Team's next steps, which may include detailed pilot studies on flow-ecology relationships in the APNEP region and incorporation of outreach or communication initiatives. Virginia Partnerships Connect Up and Downstream

This month, a map of the entire VA-NC Albemarle Watershed and a resource toolbox for educators in Virginia's Southern Watershed was made <u>available</u> on the APNEP website. APNEP staff also attended focus group meetings hosted by the City of Virginia Beach to discuss flooding in the watershed and attended the annual in-person meeting for a <u>VIMS</u> <u>project</u> that aims to build coastal resilience through increasing use of natural and nature-based features. Over the next year, APNEP will be meeting with NC stakeholders to discuss the feasibility of implementation of this project in North Carolina.

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Boat-based submerged aquatic vegetation (SAV) surveys of the low-salinity parts of the sound have been continuing this month, led by <u>Dr. Joe Luczkovich</u> and his ECU research team. In addition, finalization of data for the 2013-2014 map of SAV in the high-salinity, eastern part of the estuary is almost complete, and the final map should be made public in early September. Stay tuned this fall for more SAV-related news!

Chowan Algal Bloom Forum Raises Awareness of History and Potential Causes of Recent Blooms

Over 130 citizens and local government officials attended a community forum about recent harmful algal blooms in the Chowan River and Albemarle Sound on Saturday, August 24th. While researchers and government officials don't yet know why blooms have returned after a decades-long absence, data suggests that increased nutrients and higher water temperatures are playing a role.

The forum was organized by <u>NC Sea Grant</u> and <u>NC State University researchers</u> as part of a <u>NC Sea Grant Community Collaborative Research Grant</u>, and other partners such as APNEP, the <u>Chowan-Edenton Environmental Group</u>, the <u>NC Department of Environmental Quality</u>, <u>UNC Institute of Marine Sciences</u>, <u>NC Department of Health and Human Services</u>, and <u>NOAA</u> assisted in organizing and speaking at the event. A recording of the forum will be made available soon for those who weren't able to attend.
