Request for Proposals: Schoolyard Demonstration Projects

\$50,000 IN GRANTS AVAILABLE FROM THE ALBEMARLE-PAMLICO NATIONAL ESTUARY PROGRAM (APNEP)

We want your projects! Schools and local partners are encouraged to present proposals by 5 p.m. March 6, 2009. Details are below. Individual projects may be funded up to \$12,000, but the target range per project is around \$5,000. APNEP grants are for locations in the 36 county APNEP region, which includes five major river basins: the Chowan, Pasquotank, Roanoke, Tar-Pamlico and Neuse.

The following agencies and organizations are eligible to apply for and receive funds: 1) Educational Institutions (public, private and charter schools) including K-12,

- community colleges and universities
- 2) State and local governments
- 3) Interstate and intrastate agencies
- 4) Nonprofit organizations and institutions

The projects must comply with the following five criteria:

- 1) Must benefit the environment
- 2) Must occur on or adjacent to school property
- 3) Must be physical in-ground projects
- 4) Must have a public outreach/education element
- 5) Must allow for permanent public access
- 6) Must have transferable methods

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Progress Report: Citizens' Monitoring Network

Jennifer Garrish has been volunteering with the Citizens' Monitoring Network (CMN) for nearly 10 years. She monitors the Pamlico Sound from Ocracoke, N.C. Her efforts were able to help identify that her monitoring area is healthy with no observable differences between the 2008 dataset and data from the two previous years (see figure to right). Feature Project: Climate Ready Estuary




Figure 1. Mean dissolved oxygen (mg/L) during the 2006-2008 monitoring sessions of Pamlico Sound in Ocracoke, N.C. Dissolved oxygen levels fluctuate between 2006 through 2008; lowest measurement was in May 2006. All mean measurements are above 5 mg/L, which suggests that this monitoring location is well oxygenated.

In 2009, APNEP will serve as a host to the EPA's Climate Ready Estuaries program. Our Climate Ready Estuaries program will use the existing and accelerating impacts of climate change on our estuaries as a catalyst to bring better understanding and cooperation between our research assets in the physical, life and social sciences and our communities that depend on and are affected by changes to our estuarine systems.

Being a climate ready estuary means that people and the institutions that affect and are affected by the estuarine system must have three critical attributes:

- 1) they must be aware of coming changes to the system
- 2) they must have the motivation to adapt to the changes
- 3) they must have the capacity to adapt to the changes

Accordingly, the main focus of our program will be establishing a clear sense of public awareness in key regions of the APNEP system and educating the public and local lawmakers and resource managers about the opportunities and challenges inherent in becoming a climate ready estuary system.

Primary partnering organizations for these efforts will be the Nicholas Institute for Environmental Policy Solutions at Duke University, East Carolina University, Center for Excellence for the Study of Natural Disasters, Coastal Infrastructure, and Emergency Management at UNC-CH, Institute of the Environment at University of North Carolina, North Carolina Sea Grant, U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, Region 4, and Albemarle Pamlico Community Conservation Collaborative (AP3C), but we will use the resources in our region broadly as needed.
