This month's Monitoring and Assessment Team meetings have helped APNEP staff to narrow down our list of ecological indicators for the region; we plan to use the final set of indicators to monitor the state of Albemarle-Pamlico estuarine system.

The APNEP Action Team meetings this month included a kickoff meeting for the Water

<u>Stewardship</u> Teams. Using feedback from our Team members, we'll be working to develop plans for how we can implement each group's <u>Comprehensive Conservation &</u> <u>Management Plan</u> Actions in a way that has the greatest positive impact for both the region and for our partners.

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Holds Kickoff Meeting

As part of the state's new climate initiatives, NCDEQ will be collaborating with interdisciplinary partners to build community and ecosystem resiliency. The carbon sequestration potential of coastal wetlands was highlighted in the inaugural meeting of NCDEQ's Natural & Working Lands Stakeholder group, which met October 22. Pocosin wetlands were featured due to their role as carbon sponges, and opportunities associated with ongoing restoration efforts led by the USFWS and other partners in the region was discussed.

Over the next the Stakeholder Group will develop plan that year, а identifies opportunities for natural and working lands, prioritizes pathways for public and private lands, and identifies resources needed to implement the various pathways. We look forward to coordinating with APNEP partners to identify priorities and focus areas in our region.

APNEP Committee Updates

October 5th - APNEP's <u>Wetland Resources Monitoring and Assessment Team</u> met to determine which wetland indicators are highest priority for drafting APNEP assessments during this quarter.

October 16th - APNEP's <u>Contaminant Management Action Team</u> reconvened to discuss gaps and needs in the Albemarle-Pamlico region related to their CCMP Actions.

October 18th - APNEP's <u>Decision Support Tools Action Team</u> met and discussed needs for data management tools, including regional LiDAR data as well as the possibility of a collaborative database to house regional monitoring data.

October 19th - APNEP's <u>Aquatic Fauna Monitoring and Assessment Team</u> met to determine which aquatic fauna indicators are highest priority for drafting APNEP assessments during this quarter.

October 23rd - APNEP's <u>Engagement & Stewardship Action Team</u> met to provide feedback on an inventory of ongoing efforts in the region related to the Team's CCMP Actions, as well as to discuss APNEP's plans to develop an evaluation rubric for funding engagement & stewardship proposals.

October 24th - APNEP's Water Quality - Low Impact Development Action Team met for their kickoff meeting. The Team discussed regional needs related to the Team's CCMP Actions, including outreach and engagement strategies for LID projects.
