MINUTES

ATTENDANCE - SEE ATTACHMENT A

Chairman Carter called the meeting to order at 7:20 PM. He welcomed the general public and introduced the members of the P-CAC who were present. He then explained the accelerated meeting schedule (monthly) that the P-CAC has adopted. (See P-CAC minutes of 2/7/89 for meeting schedule through June 17, 1989.)

<u>PROGRAM UPDATE</u> - In Bob Holman's absence, Joan Giordano delivered the Director's Report. See Attachment B.

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION REPORT - Mrs. Giordano then reported on the activities pertaining to the Public Participation portion of the program. See Attachment C.

It was requested that a copy of the budget and the titles of the public participation projects selected for funding during the third cycle RFP be included in the minutes. See Attachment D.

Chairman Carter, for the benefit of those present, enumerated the public participation projects selected for funding.

Susan King praised the extended period of time allocated to the third cycle RFP and requested that an even longer period be dedicated to that process next year. Dr. Tom Quay generally complimented the progress that the A/P Study is making and added that with the drafting of the Comprehensive Conservation & Management Plan (CCMP) beginning this year, issues will become more clearly defined.

ROANOKE RIVER WILDLIFE REFUGE - Chairman Carter read from a resolution put forth by the A-CAC, endorsing the proposed refuge, and entertained discussion. He added that Connell Purvis, representing Friends of the Roanoke (con) and Otto Florschutz - USFWS (pro) had been invited to speak. Mr. Purvis could not attend. Mr. Florschutz presented a balanced account of the arguments being set forth concerning the proposed refuge. Dick Leach moved that the P-CAC endorse the resolution passed by the A-CAC and that the P-CAC be added to the resolution. Todd Miller seconded the motion. Motion carried. See Attachment E.

Chairman Carter then recognized WRAL-TV General Manager, John Greene, and described WRAL's campaign, "Save Our Sounds." Because Rep. Bruce Athridge could not be present due to pressing need in Raleigh, Chairman Carter modified the agenda slightly and reported on two bills currently being undertaken in the N.C. House. They are H.B. 34, a bill to expand the Areas of Environmental Concern to include primary nursery areas, and the second, H.B. 38, a bill to limit to five the number of members on the CRC who derive a significant part of their livelihood from development. Both of these bills, as of 3/20, were read only in the House and had not been brought up on the Senate side.

Chairman Carter then introduced the guest speaker, Mary Joan Pugh, Assistant Secretary of NRCD. Mrs. Pugh spoke at length on the process of designating and protecting Coastal Outstanding Resource Waters (ORWs). She brought several copies of a <u>draft</u> document, "Report on Coastal Outstanding Resource Waters," an extensive study which was described as a staff level report currently undergoing departmental and other agency review. No final position has been taken by NRCD with respect to the contents, conclusions, or recommendations contained in the document. A final draft is scheduled to be completed by early April, 1989. Discussion ensued.

COMMENTS/QUESTIONS - The question of ambient monitoring stations within the A/P Study was raised, principally in response to the fact that the EPA did not provide supplemental funds for monitoring this year as they did last year. Dr. Bud Cross, Policy Committee (PC) member, answered the question by stating that the PC's lowest priority choice was to proportionally decrease all other categories of funding in order to free money for monitoring. Other, more palatable choices were to try to negotiate downward the amounts requested by principal investigators for funded projects; to ask the N.C. Legislature for 300K in expansion budget funding; and to try to obtain a portion of the needed money from EPA.

The question was raised regarding the fate of the Citizens' Monitoring program relative to the funding shortfall. It was explained by Chairman Carter that Citizens' Monitoring was being funded under the technical information acquisition portion of the budget.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 9:45 PM. The next P-CAC meeting is scheduled for April 19, 1989 in Washington, NC at the Civic Center. The meeting will begin at 7:00 PM and will feature as speakers Drs. Ed Noga and Stanley Riggs.

- 1) Public Involvement Plan (PIP) will be finalized at a meeting on March 29, 1989, beginning at 10:00 AM at the Washington Regional Office. CACs serving on the Public Awareness-Government Relations Subcommittee and all other interested CACs have been invited to attend.
- 2) The PIP was presented in the second draft version to the Policy Committee on March 15, 1989. Their recommendation was to emphasize the Governmental Liaison portion as shown in the plan.
- 3) The glossy, full-color brochure describing the A/P Study will be ready for distribution in April. (See PIP for description of this product.) EPA was gracious enough to pay for the printing of the 25,000 copies we have ordered.
- 4) The next issue of the Albemarle-Pamlico Advocate will come out at the end of the month.
- 5) The newsletter mailing list is constantly being updated.
- The video PSAs done for the program by Melva Okun, UNC-CH, as a first-year funded project are running on seven TV stations throughout North Carolina. RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF ROANOKE RIVER NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE

- WHEREAS, one of the general charges to the Citizens' Advisory Committees is to provide a mechanism for structured citizens input, including providing recommendations into the APES process from their respective regions; and
- WHEREAS, the purpose of the Albemarle-Pamlico Estuarine Study Program is to enable resource managers to preserve better the productivity of the estuarine area by expanding relevant knowledge about the impact of human uses upon its physical, biological, and social systems; and
- WHEREAS, forested bottomland areas along the Roanoke River are necessary to maintaining water quality conducive to fish propagation, notably stripped bass; and
- WHEREAS, forested bottomlands are necessary to perpetuate wildlife populations along the Roanoke River and the establishment of the Roanoke River National Wildlife Refuge will help to ensure the preservation of some of the most productive and prime bottomland habitat in North Carolina; and
- WHEREAS, according to the North Carolina Division of Forest Resources there has been an average annual reduction of 20,000 acres in total forested areas statewide; and
- WHEREAS, the wetlands and forests of northeastern North Carolina's coastal plain support a variety of wildlife and conversion of that land to agriculture, commercial forestry, residential or commercial development, mining, or industrial development can have serious consequences for native organisms; and
- WHEREAS, the Lower Roanoke River Basin is the predominate headwaters of the Albemarle Sound with a drainage basin of 3,506 square miles located in North Carolina;
- NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Albemarle Citizens' Advisory Committee, in accordance with its purpose for existence, supports the establishment of the Roanoke River National Wildlife Refuge. This support is contingent on the property being obtained from willing sellers and not by way of condemnation. Be it further resolved that the Albemarle Citizens' Advisory Committee asks the Pamlico Citizens' Advisory Committee to join in support of this resolution, a copy of this resolution be sent to the Governor of North Carolina, the Chairman of the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission, the Honorable Walter B. Jones, the Honorable Terry Sanford and the Honorable Jesse Helms.
