SWIFT CREEK PROPOSED RECLASSIFICATION

GENERAL INTRODUCTION

- Classifications = criteria and standards that are required by the State for waters and their uses
- · Classifications may change if water use changes
- All surface waters are classified except treatment systems (lagoons)

PRIMARY FRESHWATER CLASSIFICATIONS:

- · Class C aquatic life, agriculture, secondary recreation
- · Class B primary recreation
- WS-I through WS-V drinking, culinary, or food processing

SUPPLEMENTAL CLASSIFICATIONS

(Additional protections for sensitive or high resource waters)

- Nutrient Sensitive Water (NSW)
 - Additional nutrient management
- Swamp (Sw) Water
 - Low velocities, pH, & DO (lowest protection)
- Outstanding Resource Water (ORW)
 - Excellent water quality and significance
- High Quality Water (HQW)
 - Water quality higher than state standards
 - All ORW WS-I and WS-II waters = HQW by def'n

OUTSTANDING RESOURCE WATERS (ORW)

- To qualify, waters must be DWQ rated as Excellent <u>and</u> have one of the following outstanding resource values:
 - outstanding fish habitat or fisheries
 - unusually high level of waterbased recreation
 - some special designation (Nat'l Wildlife Refuge)
 - important component of state or Nat'l park or forest
 - special ecological or scientific sign. (endangered sp.)
- Entire Watershed (Drainage Area)

OUTSTANDING RESOURCE WATERS (ORW)

- · Special Management Strategies
 - Requests evaluated on case-by-case basis
 - In some instances special management strategies appropriate:
 - provide add'l protection measures to protect the quality, uses and/or resource values
 - +, #, *, @ (def'n classification schedule or in BIMS & can vary by river basin)

ASSIGNMENT OF CLASSIFICATIONS

While all surface waters are generally assigned ONE PRIMARY CLASSIFICATION,

they may also have
ONE OR MORE SUPPLEMENTAL
CLASSIFICATIONS

RECLASSIFICATION PROCESS (approximately 2 year long process)

- · Receive request
 - anyone (except local gov't for water supply reclassification); application & map
- Analysis of request (including water quality study)
- · Initiate department review
- Seek WQC and EMC Permission
- · Publish Notices

RECLASSIFICATION PROCESS

- Hold public hearing (and write ROP)
- · DWQ makes recommendation
- Seek EMC action (adoption, rejection, or modification)
- · Seek RRC approval
- Send to next legislative session
- · Seek EPA approval

WATERS PROPOSED TO BE RECLASSIFIED

- Part of Sandy & Swift Cks -> ORW (approx. 14 mi)
 - From Taylors Store Road (S.R. 1004) to Red Oak Road (S.R. 1003) in Nash County
- Remainder of watershed -> "+" (approx. 193 mi)
 - Edgecombe, Franklin, Nash, Vance, Warren
 - Whitakers, Leggett, Rocky Mount, Henderson, Red Oak, Castalia, Dortches, and Centerville
- · See map and list of proposed waters

WATERS PROPOSED TO BE RECLASSIFIED

- 14-mile segment: ORW designation & strategy
 - excellent water quality
 - State and fed'l designated species (end. mussel)
- Rest of watershed: ORW strategy ONLY ("+")
 - State and fed'l designated species (end. bird & mussels) (highest div.& pop. native)
 - Significant natural heritage areas
 - Natural communities (2 imperiled)
 - Special animal habitat (rare)
 - Registered natural heritage area
- See map of observed resource locations (updated)

WATERS PROPOSED TO BE RECLASSIFIED

- "+" = Special Management Strategy
 - Where body of water is proposed to be designated ORW but the remainder of the watershed including its tributaries are not
 - This strategy would apply the minimum ORW req'ts to the balance of the watershed even though these waters are not to be designated as ORW waters

CURRENT LAND USE: PROPOSED AFFECTED AREA (270 sq. mi. drainage area)

- · Primarily forested and agricultural lands
- · Grass and shrub areas throughout area
- Notable development is mostly residential and within parts of municipalities
- Only 3 existing dischargers (glass container company in Vance County and two Edgecombe County schools)
- · See land use map

PROPOSED RECLASSIFICATION REGULATIONS: Development

- IF SEC plan required (disturb>1 acre), THEN 2 development densities:
 - Low Density
 - 1 DU (dwelling unit) per 1 acre or
 - 12% BUA (built upon area) and
 - 30' stream setback (current 50' buffer req't more stringent)
 - High Density (runoff control from 1st inch rainfall)
 - · No BUA cap and no stream setbacks

PROPOSED RECLASSIFICATION REGULATIONS: Other

- More protective sed. and erosion control req'ts
- For facilities which put WW into surface waters via piping ("dischargers"), no expansions and no new such facilities
- · No new discharging landfills
- DOT BMPs (stricter erosion controls)
- · "Q&A Sheet" summary on registration table

PROPOSED RECLASSIFICATION REGULATIONS:

How They Impact the Proposed Area

- Development: No proposed significant development (including landfills) planned in the affected area

 White and 27 hour birth denits 5/D area to 65 to 1.4.
 - Whitakers: 37 home high density S/D may be affected
- Dischargers: No proposed dischargers, and 3 dischargers have stated no plans to expand (RRO)
- · DOT BMPs: Bridge replacement and road work

TO SUMMARIZE:

How would this reclassification affect you?

- You would be impacted by the reclassification if:
 - Developer with future project requiring SEC plan in affected area (only one dev. may be affected)
 - DOT employee to be doing road/bridge work in the affected area
 - Citizens who wishes to continue enjoying natural communities, habitat, species and areas & quality

TO SUMMARIZE:

How would this reclassification affect you?

- · You would not be impacted by the reclassification if:
 - Forestry activities (silvicultural/logging operations)
 - Agricultural activities and animal operations (farms, nurseries) (no fencing required)
 - Dams and water resource projects
 - Landowner wishing to build a single family residence or expansion to home on property
 - Docks and other water dependent structures
 - Secondary recreational use (boat, wade, fish)

Re: Washington Wetland Model

This is a contract for exhibit design, fabrication and installation services to be performed by **Design Dimension Inc.** (design/builder) for **The Partnership for the Sounds** (client).

Scope of Services:

The exhibit will interpret the water cleansing properties of a re-created wetland that is being installed adjacent to the North Carolina Estuarium in Washington, NC. The exhibit will be similar to the preliminary sketches we developed (enclosed), with the following changes:

- The model will be tilted slightly on a diagonal so the water will drain to the front right corner. A pipe in the model will show how the storm water is taken to the wetland location.
- We will reduce the scale of the townscape—zoom out, as it were—in order to depict a longer section of riverfront in the same amount of space.
- The water in the system will be self-contained and not require plumbing hookup. Water will have to be replenished periodically.
- The walk-up rail and the model itself will include text, graphics, and images.


Fee:




